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

Is this your first time at the Golden Gate Conference ? You may have some questions. Here are some suggestions for making your conference smooth, enjoyable, and beneficial.

I've brought my best manuscript to the conference. Who may I give it to?

Manuscripts may be shared with faculty ONLY during 1:1 critique sessions, which require pre-registration. Please be respectful and do not ask if an editor or agent will read your manuscript.

But how do I get the editor, agent or art director to look at my work?

After the conference, you may follow the submission guidelines published for attendees. All editors, agents and art directors also have the option of viewing the Portfolio Show.

When is my paid critique or roundtable?

Many of the critiques and roundtables for this event are virtual. You should receive an email reminding you of your critique day and time. Missed critiques cannot be rescheduled. Arrive at your consultation early. Please check your sound and wifi or internet connection in advance of your time.

I've never received a critique before. How can I make the most of the fifteen minutes I have with this industry professional?

If this is the first time anyone has ever seen your manuscript or portfolio, you may have an emotional reaction to it being discussed in such an objective manner. Just remember: reviewers want to help you get your work submission ready—which often requires cuts and multiple rewrites. Listen to what they have to say and feel free to take notes. Ask questions and clarify things your reviewer says that you don't understand. Resist the temptation to defend your work. Be sure to thank them for their time and thought, and wait until after the conference to thoroughly process their feedback.

Resist the temptation to defend your work.

Will the reviewer offer to buy my manuscript?

It is extremely rare for a manuscript to be sold during a critique session. The value of these critiques is professional feedback on your work and creating industry connections.

Is everyone here published?

No. We have a variety of writers and illustrators who are traditionally published, self-published, and pre-published.

Can I ask the faculty questions?

Absolutely! There will be Q & A time at the end of each session. Outside of sessions, you are welcome to chat with the faculty, but please be respectful of their time and privacy. This includes such common courtesies as not cornering them in the restroom, not interrupting conversations, and not monopolizing their time.

I need a critique group. How can I get invited into one?

The only guaranteed way to get into a critique group is to start one. We have a writers' critique group coordinator and an illustrator group coordinator who can help you connect wiht others seeking critique partners.

What is the SCBWI SF/South policy for blogging and recording?

Audio taping, video taping and/or transmitting or aiding in any of the foregoing of any part of any SCBWI event (including, but not limited to, presentations, individual sessions and networking events) is prohibited. Additionally, the material, including but not limited to handouts and presentations is copyrighted and may not be reprinted, blogged, written, orally transmitted, and/or reproduced without written permission of the copyright holder. We think it's great when bloggers share thoughts about their overall experience, offer a personal anecdote, and/or briefly talk about something that resonated with them. However, it is equally important that bloggers not give away that which is not theirs to give.

The fair use policy issued by SCBWI above refers to speakers' rights, authors' rights, and illustrators' rights, under any circumstances, and it pertains to the content of our speakers' talks, workshops, and/or handouts. This falls into the category of protecting intellectual property. Again, personal impressions, a quote that is cited, and/or a general overview would be considerate. However, it would be a breach of copyright law to give away a detailed report of a presenter's material without the presenter's express written permission. Thank you in advance for taking this policy into account. Your professionalism is greatly appreciated. In addition, the sessions in the main room will be recorded and available for purchase for an additional \$5.

As a rule, faculty prefer you take what you have learned from the conference and revise your manuscript or dummy before submitting. Please be professional and follow all guidelines outlined below.

Jennifer March Soloway:

What to submit: Query Letter + the first 10 pages of a novel

Please submit via email or Query Manager, QueryManager.com/JenniferMarchSoloway/SCBWI, with the subject line of "SCBWI Golden Gate Day 2024".

I wish everyone the best of luck with their projects! I hope to respond within 12 weeks.

Sally Kim:

What to submit: Query letter along with portfolio link, full picture book manuscript, or fifty first pages of a chapter book or middle grade novel.

Please submit via email or Query Manager, https://querymanager.com/query/sallyabla, with the subject line of "SCBWI SFS 2024".

I aim to respond to all queries within a month.

Ian Lendler

What to submit: For picture books, please submit the full manuscript. For non-fiction or chapter books, please submit the first ten pages. Graphic novels, Please send first ten pages of script, synopsis, and first ten inked pages.

Please submit via email to ian@mckinnonliterary.com, with the subject line of "SF SCBWI manuscript submission".

I will respond via email within 2 weeks.

Tracy Shaw

What to submit: Please send art samples, portfolio/website links, and book dummies.

Please submit via email to Tracy.Shaw@hbgusa.com, with the subject line of "Artwork/book dummy for review".

Art Directors don't acquire, but we play active roles in suggesting artists and book dummies to Editorial. I will respond via email and ask for a month before querying again.

Kristie Choi:

What to submit: For picture books, send the query letter and full manuscript or dummy; for novels, send the query letter and first 10 pages.

Please submit via email to kristie.submissions@gmail.com with the subject line of "SCBWI Golden Gate: [TITLE of the book] by [author name] ".

I'll do my best to respond to all submissions via email within 2 months, but please assume that no response after 2 months is a pass. Please make sure to indicate the genre and age format of the manuscript in your query letter (ex. young adult contemporary, middle grade fantasy, picture book, picture book biography)

Connie Hsu:

What to submit: Connie will be accepting submissions from those attendees with agents only. Agents may email Connie directly with "SCBWI attendee" in the subject line.

My response time is 6-10 weeks and I will respond by email. Kindly submit only one manuscript at a time.

What to submit: For picture books: query letter and full manuscript and/or layout. For novels: query letter and first 20 pages of manuscript, double spaced in 12 point Times New Roman please.

Please submit a hard copy via postal service to Eleonore Fisher, Macmillan Children's Publishing Group, 120 Broadway, 24th FL, New York, NY 11238 with "ATTN: SCBWI Golden Gate Day 2024 Submission".

I will respond via snail mail within one month of receipt. Please make sure the comps in your query letter were originally published in 2021 or later. Also, please include what inspired you to write your manuscript and what you hope your dream reader takes away from your story.

Carter Hasegawa:

What to submit: A query letter in body of email with full MS as Word attachment.

I will respond within 6 months.

Wendi Gu

What to submit: For novels, please include the query and first ten pages in the body of the email. For picture book illustrators and author/illustrators, please attach your dummy or portfolio as a PDF or link. Please write her at wgu@sjga.com.

Please submit to wgu@sjga.com with the subject line "QUERY:TITLE by Author ".

Even though her list is full of them, Wendi sometimes can't resist a gorgeous picture book text. So if you have one of those, please incluing the query and full pb ms in the body of an email as well. I will respond in 8 weeks.
