In 2024, Mary Beth was selected as a PBParty finalist for her manuscript RUBY'S SUNSHOWER ROMP. In addition to honorable mentions in Vivian Kirkland's #50PreciousWords and the Spring Fling Writing contests, her short story ANGEL VOICES, won a place in the 2022 #50PreciousWords competition. She admits to being a picture book-a-holic, believing that they hold lessons and inspiration for every life experience, no matter the reader's age.

Facilitating journaling workshops at SEC and organizing a Literary Festival at St. Peter School for 10 years connected her to a special writing community and planted a seed of desire to write her own stories. A lifelong journaler with a graduate degree in Educational Psychology, her lyrical picture books often have an SEL theme and threads of family tradition and nature. Her four children and two grandbabies give her plenty of material for her picture books. Mary Beth hopes to infuse her own family experiences into her writing to encourage children and their families.

Finding Comparative Texts with NoveList Plus

In January we welcomed guest speaker, Elly Roberts, of the Omaha Public Library. Elly guided us on an online tour of the amazing library search tool called NoveList Plus.

NoveList Plus generates a list of book titles based on "story elements" that the reader – or in this case author – is looking for. One can generate titles based on genre, theme, date published, or even as specific as tone, storyline, pace, and more. Think "race against time" or "misfits united" or "slice of life."

Finding the right comp titles can sometimes feel like a daunting task, but NoveList Plus narrows the search. If you have struggled with finding the perfect comps, this tool is absolutely invaluable. Most libraries offer this online program. You will need a library membership and can simply log in to your library's website with your card number. For Omaha Public Library patrons, from the home page, look for NoveList Plus in Quick Links or Story Elements. If you need assistance, Elly assured us that librarians are more than happy to help. Just ask!


